II. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Prepares students for success in college with emphasis on study strategies as applied in various content areas, academic reading/thinking strategies, and an evaluation of individual strengths and weaknesses as a student. For students with ACT scores 15 and above.

III. SPECIFIC LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- A. To develop a broader reading and speaking vocabulary in content areas.
- B. To develop a knowledge of and ability to apply basic study strategies in varied academic situations.
- C. To develop basic comprehension and critical reading and thinking strategies.
- D. To develop the ability to make more effective use of library resources.
- E. To develop communication skills including reading, writing, listening, and speaking.
- F. To develop the ability to use networking to become more successful as a student.
- G. To assist student in learning to accept responsibility for his/her own learning and study.

IV. TEACHING STRATEGIES:

The following teaching strategies will be incorporated as appropriate: lecture, class discussion, group work, and student presentations. The following technology will be utilized: PowerPoint presentations, video presentations, and online database exploration.

V. REQUIREMENTS AND ASSIGNMENTS:

Specific directions for each activity will be presented in class when due dates are given. **Failure to complete mandatory assignments will result in a failing grade.**

- A. Regular attendance and class participation
- B. 50 study/vocabulary cards (MANDATORY)
- C. Book Report (MANDATORY)
- D. Study skills homework assignments
- E. Brief writing assignments (generally less than one page)
- F. Textbook assignments and quizzes
- G. Maintenance of a work folder for in-class assignments and turn in all work completed
- H. A written exam based on text, lectures, audio-visual material, handouts and class discussion
- I. Retest on standardized tests at completion of course (MANDATORY)
- J. The student is responsible for his/her own work. Copying, plagiarism, or other forms of academic dishonesty are not acceptable behaviors. If a student engages in any form of academic dishonesty, action will be taken in accordance with university policy (see Student Handbook).

You will have the opportunity almost every day for participation points from in class work. **Points will be given for textbook assignments only if you are present in class with completed homework. Points for in class activities will require active participation.**

The following grading scale will be applied:

Note: Students receiving a grade of A or B must, by the end of the course, score at or above the 42nd percentile on the Nelson Denny Reading Test in vocabulary, comprehension, and/or the equivalent.

680-779 = C
585-679 = D

Extra Credit: A maximum of 50 points of extra credit work may be completed with permission of the instructor.

ALL WORK IS DUE ON THE INSTRUCTED DUE DATE NO LATE WORK WILL BE ACCEPTED UNLESS PRIOR ARRANGEMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE.

VIII. ATTENDANCE/WITHDRAWAL POLICY:

Role will be taken daily. Class members are expected to attend ALL class sessions on time and to be fully prepared. Participation in classroom discussion and group activities is desirable and expected. The interaction between various members of the class often leads to greater learning than any that could be provided by the instructor alone. Students are responsible for all reading assignments, handouts, visuals, lectures, and presentations.

In the event that you must withdraw from the class, an official withdrawal process must be completed as outlined in the university catalog.
